

1901 living at 3 Bridge St



JOHN RICHARD EVANS (J.R.)

J. R (as he was commonly known) was one of the sons of John Evans y Crydd (Cobbler) and his wife Eleanor. The family came originally from Tr'r Ddol, in the north of the county, where many of his family were buried. When J. R's famioy moved tp Aberaeron he founded the Salem Wesley Chapel (this is now the Roman Catholic church)


John died at the age of 59 and J. R. had to leave school to run the family business; this was a great disappointment to him as he wanted to enter the church. However he proved to be a good businessman and soon after his father's death he bought Anchor House where the business continued to thrivedlt would not be considered too much to think that J. R had enough on his hands with running his business and bringing up a family but he was made of sterner stuff. He saw his sins through University Oxford, Cambridge and one at Manchester University who studied Electrical Engineering. When his daughters came of age he had the vision to give them a chance of further education not commonplace in those days. He also found time to give his service to his community and especially the Church. He had left the Wesley Chapel when he married and became a member of the Calvinistic Methodist Chapel at the Tabernacle in Aberaeron, where he was deacon for 56 years. He was for many years governor of the Church of England School, Chairman of the Aberaeron District Council and Chairman of the local Savings Committee. He also fitted in many other public activities; he was made governor of the local Secondary School and was a J.P

I dedicate this pamphlet to my first cousin and best friend. Huw was (as I am) a grandchild of J. R Evans. He inherited many of the strengths from J. R, particularly in his work as Executive Director of the International Monetary Fund and World Bank where he was especially associated with international moves toward debt forgiveness for the poorest nations, a cause to which he was passionately committed. He was eloquent in persuading politicians all over the world to support his proposals.

After J. R's death his Daughter, Mrs Evelyn Lewis took over the business & and at her retirement she sold the business to another Evans 'Fred'. Marlene Fred's daughter then took over until the business was sold in 2020. After 120 years the sale of shoes terminated at 3 Bridge Street Aberaeron.
